Europe Day at the European School

TEDx Event at the European School

On May 22, the 6th annual TEDxIBEuropeanSchool conference was held at the European School. It was a licensed, independently organized event which re-created the unique TED experience. The European School students presented twelve idea-focused talks on wide range of subjects. A young jazzman, Papuna Sharikadze, joined our students, delivered an inspirational speech and performed a piano recital.

The theme of the event was "Finding a New Point of View." The students' talks were an organic representation of their interests, based on their personal points of view and shaped by their life experiences and values. The attendees had an opportunity to look at phobias, modeling, winemaking, personal diaries, veganism and even homework from different angles. The event fostered inspiration and was an intellectual stimulation for the delegates.



Celebrating Independence Day at the European School

A whole series of events designed to celebrate Independence Day of Georgia were planned at the European School. Students exhibited national symbols of first Republic of Georgia: the flag, coat of arms, currency, etc. Students discussed the importance of Independence Day and decorated the school yard with Independence Day symbols. American High School grade 10 students covered the walls with "100 FREE" signs.

On May 26, 2018 the day started with a flag-raising ceremony. The flag was designed and made by our students. The students were dressed in Georgian flag-themed t-shirts of their own design. The School played the anthem of Democratic Republic of Georgia during the flag-raising ceremony.



The Robotics Lab hosted demo lessons. The students presented a project about Democratic Republic of Georgia. They worked individually and in teams, made brochures about Democratic Republic of Georgia and distributed them among students and teachers. They tried their hand at drawing the old and current flags of Georgia with a 3D pen.

The day ended in the main hall of the European School – Irakli Khvadagiani, a young researcher from Soviet Past Research Laboratory, sat down with our students and discussed the unique archival collections.

Minister of Justice of Georgia Visits the European School

On May 30, 2018, Tea Tsulukiani, Minister of Justice of Georgia, visited the European School and attended Grade 9-10 students' project presentations. Students were split into German- and French-speaking groups. In groups students discussed bullying: the causes and symptoms, possible negative effects of bullying and ways to prevent it.

They learned about how other countries – France and Germany, in particular – tackle bullying.

Toward the end, the Minister summarized the meeting and informed our students about the mechanisms that Ministry of Justice of Georgia has put in place to prevent bullying. In her concluding speech, she touched on the importance of learning French and German languages as part of global competence.



American High School Grade 10 Visit BOLNISI-TANDZIA



On Friday, June 1, seventeen Grade 10 students accompanied by their Georgian teacher, Mrs. Tekla Beradze, and Mr. Joseph Blake, Director with two professional hiking guides explored the natural beauty of the hills of Georgia on their way to admire the famed church of Bolnisi – Tandzia. Encapsulating the vibrant historical and religious nature of the area and the foundations of the church in the 13th Century, both students and staff were mesmerized by the verdant valley and tranquility of its location.
